





1st Virtual Education Grand Rounds



Standardized Patient Bank

The Standardized Patient Bank was established by the DED -AKU in 2001 for teaching, learning and assessment in the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes of the Faculty of Health Sciences. Currently the SP Bank at AKU has 100 registered simulated patients and 5 real patients. This SP Bank strengthens the curriculum introducing students to clinical and communication skills from the very beginning of the curriculum as novice students need a safe environment to learn, make mistakes and practice these skills, before they apply these skills on real patients. The use of SPs is very convenient since it provides cases according to educational needs at the time and place they are needed. DED has arranged and trained their SPs for Virtual Clinical Skills sessions for MBBS Year I and II and for School of Nursing & Midwifery exams conducted on MS Teams / Zoom for the first time at AKU.

Open Book Examination

An open book exam (OBE) is a kind of assessment method that allows students to refer to approved open resources while attempting the examination. The design of OBE is aimed towards testing higher order thinking of the students which involves problem solving and critical thinking. The format encourages application of knowledge in a critical and analytical way rather than 'rote-memorization' and mere transfer of information from book to the answer sheet.

Types of OBE: Depending on the resources, OBE can be of restricted and unrestricted type. The restricted type allows the students to consult only limited resources approved by the course faculty. This type is mainly true for printed material resource without any kind of personal notes and are more likely to serve the purpose of appendices to the exam itself.

The unrestricted type offers a wide range of unlimited resources including the web to be utilized by the examinee. However, when designed efficiently, OBE questions cannot be answered by simply looking up for them from unlimited resources.

Impact: Like any other assessment, the OBE format has a strong impact on teaching and learning strategies for faculty and students.

Key Considerations for Designing an OBE: According to the literature, following are some key considerations for devising questions for an OBE:

- 1. Types of Questions: Whether SAQs, MCQs, EMQs, it must assess application of knowledge/concept and NOT the recall. They should assess the ability of students to interpret, apply, analyze, evaluate and synthesize given information.
- 2. Development of Questions: The questions should be clear and unambiguous to avoid students' confusion and should NOT be readily available/searchable in resources. Use of Socratic questions will be helpful, for example, questions requiring clarification, assumption, justification, evidence, implication, opinion etc. It is preferable to use case-based questions or triggering scenario to assess higher-order thinking skills such as critical thinking and problem solving.
- 3. Resources: The OBE should encourage students to effectively utilize the resources to translate the needed information but NOT to simply transfer it from resources to answer book. The resources may include text-books, class notes, e-books, internet or any permitted material.
- **4. Proctoring and duration:** OBE may or may not be proctored, can be taken live (in-class or online) or can be administered as take-home assignments. Although sufficiently time-bound, the duration of OBE may be longer than the traditional closed book format.
- **5. Faculty and students training:** Training of faculty in devising efficient and effective OBE as well as training of students in terms of preparing and attempting such exam format while utilizing the resources in time constrained environment, is a challenge but essential.
